GROW WILD COMMUNITY PROJECT FUNDING 2018

Have you got a ridiculously exciting idea for a project that brings people together through activities that help connect their community and celebrate UK native wild flowers, plants and/or fungi?

Grow Wild is awarding funding of £2,000 or £4,000 to groups and projects that:

- Stand out from the crowd: listen to your beneficiaries – be creative together, try something new that reaches new audiences.
- Focus on UK native wild flowers, plants and/or fungi, highlighting the importance of these species for the environment, and for quality of life.
- Will engage one or more of these groups:
 - o Young people aged 12-18
 - o Students and young people aged 18-25
 - o People living in urban areas
 - o People experiencing hardship and reduced access to services
 - o Adults that are less engaged with their community and environmental activities
- Will encourage large scale community involvement, ideally in the hundreds!
- Will deliver the project in a space or location that is accessible to the general public i.e. is not in a restricted or controlled area

You are eligible to apply if you are a voluntary, youth or community group, which is constituted, not-for-profit or charitable. In particular:

- Youth groups
- Secondary schools
- Parish, town and community councils
- Health authorities, health boards and prisons
- A group that is able to deliver and be financially responsible for a community project.
- A group that holds a bank account in the name of their group and can show evidence of this to Grow Wild.

young green thumbs as part of Greening Grey Britain. We're offering a number of groups expert hands-on support from our Community Outreach team, plus up to £500 worth of plants and materials – to help communities bring their green visions to life.

Groups must take part in Britain in Bloom (either at a regional or national level), It's Your Neighbourhood, be a registered RHS Affiliated Society or part of the RHS Campaign for School Gardening. This year we're asking applicants to show how their transformations would fit in with at least one of the following four garden themes. If your project idea addresses more than one of these, please describe the links and detail of how it would work:

- Create a space that will help to address local issues caused by climate change.

- Create a garden to help promote better health and wellbeing
- Create a productive space with fresh, seasonal food to share and enjoy with others
- Create a space for wildlife and to boost local biodiversity.

COMMUNITY TREES FUND

The Tree Council is the UK's lead charity for trees and works in partnership with communities, organisations and Government to make trees matter to everyone. The Community Trees Fund, which forms part of the Council's annual Community Action Programme, opened for applications on 4th December 2017 with new guidance notes and application forms.

The programme funds trees of appropriate species, size and numbers. Groups may apply for the costs up to four fruit trees on semi-vigorous, vigorous and very vigorous rootstocks.

Applications must be made on behalf of a community group which must be a charity/not for profit organisation.

Children under the age of 16 years must be actively involved in the planting process.

Planting must take place on publicly accessible land, usually in public or charity ownership.

The community group must be able to raise 25% of planting costs.

Planting must take place during National Tree Week (or as soon as possible afterwards).

Hedge plants, willow and retrospective costs will not be funded.

Applications will be accepted from 4th December 2017 to 31 March 2018.

SURVEY SEEKS TO RESEARCH VALUE OF URBAN GREEN SPACES TO OLDER PEOPLE

Multi-disciplinary research project, Green Infrastructure and the Health and wellbeing Influences on an Ageing population (GHIA), is running a survey that seeks to capture arts practice specifically engaged with issues of ecology, biodiversity, geographies and uses of green (nature) and blue (water) spaces. The project aims to better understand the benefits and values of urban green spaces to older people and how these spaces can be an important part of healthy ageing in urban areas.

GHIA members include The University of Manchester, the University of Salford and Manchester Metropolitan University. Funded by the Natural Environment Research Council, the Arts and Humanities Research Council and the Economic and Social Research Council under the Valuing Nature programme.

Findings from the survey will form part of the written outputs of the project and will inform future research. All data will be anonymised prior to publication. Click on the link to complete the survey questionnaire.
